How did you prepare for the semester abroad?

I did not prepare much, aside from at least familiarising myself with the Irish English accent.

How did you establish social networks in your host country? Do you have any tips on how this can be achieved?

I mostly joined some Erasmus or international chat grpups and talked to my neighbours in the student village, which helped establishing contact. My advice is to be open and welcoming to everybody, which will lead to establishing of relationships.

Did you learn the local language, respectively how important did you think it was for your stay?

Since Irelands day to day language is English and not Irish, I already knew it, however I did not learn Irish. English is of course very important in order to communicate with locals and to take the courses. Without at least fluent conversational knowwledge of English, I would not advise going to Ireland.

How was the study program at the partner university structured? (e.g. premises, workload, language of instruction, examination forms, accessibility) What intercultural encounters/competencies shaped your stay?

As my study program at home is interdisciplinary, I was allowed to choose freely from any courses at least tangentially connected to European Cultures and Society. The workload is very similar to Flensburg, however there are midterm examinations around 2 months into the semester. Due to the Covid restrictions, I was examined solely through research papers.

I really have not changed my views on Germany or Ireland, aside from a deeper understanding of the Irish view on Europe and the EU and a first hand account on the Republic of Irelands view on the "troubles"

Irleand is also relatively similar, since both countries are EU countries, and also was very supportive of a vegan lifestyle. However, one of the most common shops in Ireland called Dunnes does not take foreign debit Cards, and you can either pay by Credit Card or Cash.

What are the unique or special issues in the host country and what were the opportunities for engaging with these issues?

The cost of living in Ireland, especially rent is very high, I paid 700 Euros a month for a small room in pecialised student accomodation. There really is not much you can do about that, 700 Euro is actually rather low. But one has to be very mindful of that when choosing Ireland. Another issue, that I had to cope with, is that it is pretty much expected to own a credit card in Ireland and many shops and other facilities expect you to pay by credit card.
