2. Your story

How did you prepare for the semester abroad?

As preparation for my semester abroad I followed the guidelines provided by the EUF and the Masaryk University. The Masaryk University has a special website for foreign/exchange students where you can access all the information you need. Additionally I started following the Masaryk University's Instagram Account where they provide students with additional information such as good places to visit, apps for the Czech Republic, packing lists, etc.

How did you establish social networks in your host country? Do you have any tips on how this can be achieved?

I decided to live in the dorms where I met most of my friends. I also took part in the orientation week of the Masaryk University where I also met a lot of people. The Masaryk University also has a buddy programme where you get assigned a buddy according to your own interests. The Erasmus Student Network Brno also organizes a lot of activities where you can meet people. When meeting new people my tip is to be open-minded and to also try new things. Especially in the beginning just try to take part in as many activities as possible.

How was the study program at the partner university structured? (e.g. premises, workload, language of instruction, examination forms, accessibility) What intercultural encounters/competencies shaped your stay?

The courses at Masaryk University were structured similarly to the ones in Flensburg. There is a lecture period followed by an examination period. The only difference (at least for me) was that there were midterm tests and presentations throughout the semester which were graded.

All of my courses were in English. The courses were easily accessible via the module catalogue and registration was also very easy via the Masaryk University's information system (like Studiport, Moodle all in one).

In the Czech Republic the grades are A, B, C, D, E and they will be transformed into our system at the end of your Erasmus.

My final grades were made up of the grades of the midterm tests, presentations and final exams or papers.

What intercultural encounters/competencies shaped your stay?

During my Erasmus i met a lot of people from all over the world. The conversations we had made me more open-minded and

gained more perspectives and different viewpoints on different topics. I also became more conscious of my own upbringing and culture. Sometimes you have to live somewhere else to become aware of this. During my Erasmus I also became more confident.

Which perspectives on the host country/country of origin have changed and why?

Before going to the Czech Republic I considered it to be part of Eastern Europe. While being there I realized that this understanding came from a very Western European point of view as the Czech Republic considers itself to be more central European. I also learned how different topics can be treated differently in different countries.

What was your daily life like where you were? (e.g. living, shopping, leisure, inclusion) My daily life in Brno consisted of my studies and a lot of walks as I had a Corona semester abroad and there was a lockdown in the Czech Republic for most of my stays. But by going for walks I got to know Brno so much better and fell in love with the city. Brno is a student city with a normally lively nightlife. There are a lot of bars, pubs and restaurants. My friends and I often times went for walks and stop at a café to get a coffee to go. It is also possible to live a very sustainable life inBrno. There are a lot of vegan places, a vegetable market and zero waste shops. The public transport in Brno is also very good. Normally there stops a bus/tram every 10 minutes in front of the dorm so you can get to the city centre quite easy. There are also nighttime buses which leave frequently from the main train station. The university also offers sports courses and there are a lot of gyms in the city as well as a bouldering hall. The Czech Republic is a great country for travelling. As a student you get a lot of discounts on train tickets. For example can you get from Brno to Prague (~ 3 hours) for less than two euros. Brno is in the south-east of the Czech Republic. From there it is only a 1 ½ hour train ride to Vienna or Bratislava.

To conclude, I reallyenjoyed my semester abroad and living in Brno.

How did you manage with the money?

As the Czech Republic is in grooup 3 of the Erasmus grant you will get $330 \in$ a month. With this life is easily managable in the Czech Republic. I decided to live in the dorms because it was the easisest but also the cheapest. For my single room in the dorm Sladkého I paid $130 \in$ per month. (Bonus: At Masaryk University you can apply for an Accomodation Grant even as an exchange student. With this I got ~ $108 \in$). Food prices are almost the same as in Germany. Some products are cheaper, some are a bit more expensive. The cheapest thing in contrast to Germany is going out to restaurants, bars, pubs. Generally a meal doesn't cost more than $8 \in$. And little funfact: Beer is mostly cehaper than water.

For my bus/tram ticket in Brno I paid $25 \in$ for three months. All in all I can say that life in the Czech Republic is considerably cheap and that it is manageable to get by with the Erasmus grant.







