## YOUR PERSONAL EXPERIENCE

How did you prepare for the semester abroad? What should be organized in advance?

I did not had to prepare a lot in advance. Besides looking for accommodation, I took care of a foreign travel health insurance (mine did not cover everything and I just wanted to be insured in every possible scenario). I booked my train ticket and luckily there is a direct train connection from Flensburg to Prague Main Station running nearly every day. The journey takes around nine hours and you can enjoy the pretty landscapes around the Czech border (Saxon Switzerland, Elbe Sandstone Mountains). So, the journey does not involve much planning and you are not limited regarding luggage.

Where did you live and how did you find your The Metropolitan University does not offer student accommodation, which made accommodation (self-organized/provided by host flat hunting quite hard. I joined several Facebook groups and connected with university, dormitory/private etc.)? other Erasmus students. Together with nine other internationals, I rented a flat in Prague 2 via "Erasmus in Prague", an organisation which offers accommodation for incoming international students and organises events to socialise (https://erasmusinprague.com/). We had to pay our rent in cash at their office and at the end of our stay we had to leave our apartment two weeks earlier than planned because there was a misunderstanding with our contract. So, I am not sure if I would recommend the organisation for renting, but maybe the issues just happened in our particular case. I heard that others had good experiences with "student-room-flat" (https://student-room-flat.com/). Also, after being accepted at the MUP, their international office sent me a guide which also included suggestions for accommodation. Did you participate in events for exchange students? How Sadly, the Metropolitan University did not organised a lot of events to socialise did you establish social contacts in other ways? with other students in the beginning of the semester. However, I heard that they are planning to change that and that they did it more before Covid and want to resume it. Nevertheless, there are two big organisations, focused on international students and the planning of events. One is called 'Oh my Prague!' (http://ohmyprague.com/home/) and the other one is 'Erasmus in Prague', as mentioned previously. They organise weekend trips, walking tours, parties, drinking games, pub crawls, karaoke and much more. I often went to the Dogsbar on Wednesdays (definitely recommend that). In the beginning, I spent lots of time with my roommates but later one I also met other people. I would also recommend to take part in the MUP buddy program. My buddy was great and its really helpful to have someone there who knows their way around. How satisfied were you with the host university (facilities, I really liked the Metropolitan University. Before my arrival, the communication staff etc.) and the course offer (workload etc.)? with the international office was easy and they replied quite quickly to any of my questions. They offer a lot of interesting courses in the realm of International Relations / European Studies and I learned a lot about the EU accession of the post-Soviet countries and in particular of the Czech Republic. In my opinion, the educational standards were a bit higher than in Flensburg and some courses were pretty challenging. The lecturers were all very professional and passionate about their field and they put a lot of effort in the preparation of their lectures. The University has two buildings which are both located a bit on the outskirts of Prague and can be reached via tram or via the metro (main building). Did you learn the local language? How important was the I did not learn Czech during my stay in Prague. But I know that the MUP offers language for your stay? Czech classes for beginners and you can even get ECTS for them. I decided against such a course because my timetable was already packed and I am not the best in learning languages. Looking back, I regret not doing the course and learning at least some basics. Nevertheless, most of the Czech people and especially the younger generations speak English. So, one can navigate through Prague without knowing any Czech even though the language barrier was sometimes challenging (e.g., when the cashier talks to you and you do not understand anything and she becomes angry) What intercultural experiences/skills have marked your It was definitely new to me to be in a country where I do not speak or understand stav? the native language. Also, I would not necessarily say that the Czech Republic is a country marked by hospitality and openness to foreigners (my perception and definitely not generalisable . For instance, in many Czech restaurants, the waiters do not greet you with a smile or are overly friendly as it is the case in Germany. This is something I noticed quickly and which kind of confused me in the beginning. However, later when uni started they told us at the introduction day that this is normal and just the Czech mentality. My roommates came from all around Europe and I learned a lot about their cultures and traditions, especially during Christmas time. So, if you are interested in this topic, Prague and the MUP is your place to go. Also, after my semester abroad, I really valued the German bread

If you<br>go to the right places (not necessarily in the city centre) eating out is really<br>cheap and there are many good restaurants, where you can get a nice meal for<br>around 10 Euros. As already mentioned, public transportation, to travel and beer<br>is also quite affordable. I received "Auslandsbafög" during my semester abroad<br>and I had no financial struggles at all. Overall, I would say that my costs of living<br>were lower in Prague than in Flensburg, so if you are on a budget for your<br>Erasmus, the Czech Republic might be the right destination for you. |
